




CCC Family Letter (Summer Edition)

There are many biblical images of the church –the Body of Christ (1 Cor. 12:27), the bride of Christ (Rev. 19:7-8), the building (1 Pet. 2:5), the Temple of God (2 Cor. 6:16). One of them is the church as a family of God (2 Cor.6:18). Christians are God's sons and daughters. We are bonded by the Holy Spirit through our faith in Christ Jesus. We call God our 'Abba, Father' (Rom. 8:15). We address Him as our Heavenly Father when we pray – "Our Father in heaven..." (Mt. 6:9). Like our earthly father, He would provide our daily needs. We can stop worrying about tomorrow. (Mt. 6:25-34). Many earthly fathers like to give inheritance to their children. Likewise, our Heavenly Father would give to His children the inheritance of eternal life in the Kingdom of God (Mt. 19:29). Unlike the earthly inheritance, it is imperishable and immortal. However, Apostle Paul warns those who follow the loose living of the secular society based on sophisticated argument will not inherit the kingdom of God (1 Cor. 6:9-10; Gal. 5:20-21). Those who belong to Christ, live by the Spirit and produce fruit of the Spirit has the inheritance kept for them with the Spirit as the deposit guaranteeing it (Eph.1:14).

We are brothers and sisters

As God's children we address one another as brother or sister (Acts 6:3). When Christians are in need we are meant to support them as our brothers and sisters in the Lord. For example, the early church took the responsibility to look after the widows that were alone and in real need. They treated them

as their own mothers. (1 Tim. 5:2). Another example is found in the church at Antioch. When prophet Agabus predicted there would be severe famine spread across the entire Roman world, the disciples, as each one was able, decided to provide help for the brothers and sisters living in Judea (Acts 11:29). Finally, Apostle Paul praises the Thessalonian Christians for their love for one another. "Now about your love for one another we do not need to write to you, for you yourselves have been taught by God to love each other. And in fact, you do love all of God's family throughout Macedonia. Yet we urge you, brothers and sisters, to do so more and more." (1 Thess. 4:9-10)

Our love for our brothers and sisters in Christ should also extend to others. As the bible says, "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life." (John 3:16) In the late 60s and early 70s, CCC shared the gospel and extended their love to the overseas students mainly from Hong Kong, Malaysia, Singapore and Indonesia. Some became Christians and found their "spiritual home" in this church. After their graduation and settled in Sydney, they became the core members for the English Service started in 1976.

In the mid-1970, Rev and Mrs T. K. Tjoe who were then members of CCC, devoted their lives to care for the Timorese refugees. They brought them to the church. Members reached out to them with the gospel and assisted them in their daily needs. Many of them not only found a new life in Sydney but more importantly, in Jesus Christ. Chung Chen CCC was eventually established in 1987. Over the 55 years, our members had welcome migrants from Hong Kong, Indonesia, Taiwan and China. Cantonese and Mandarin Service were established. Branch churches were planted in Strathfield (WSCCC), North Epping (NDCCCS), Glenhaven (HDCCCS), Kingsgrove (SWCCC). We even

adopted ESCCC in Randwick. Our Heavenly Father has blessed His children through the love of His Son Jesus Christ and by the power of the Holy Spirit.

We have problems

It is a reality that family members sometimes do have quarrels and conflicts with each other. As a result they may not talk to each other. In worse cases they may even leave the family. Such incidents also happened in our church, God's family, for we are no saints. These quarrels were often arised from miscommunication and misunderstanding. Certainly, our different personalities and cultural differences might have been the contributors to these. They can be resolved if only we are patient to listen to one another. As James says "be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry" (James 1:19). Someone once said to me God has given us two ears but one mouth is for a purpose – to listen more and speak less.

Being judgmental is another big problem in the church. We often jump into conclusion before knowing all the facts. We pre-judge a person based on our preconception of the person. We do not give the person a benefit of doubt. We don't even realize our own problem in the disguise of "being concerned" for the other person. Pride or self-centeredness is a deadly enemy. The bible says, "God opposes the proud" (James 4:6) Pride steals the glory from God. Pride stops us from listening to the others, accepting others' view, admitting our wrong and saying "Sorry!"

Living in peace and harmony

Many broken relationships can be healed and restored if only we humble ourselves before the Lord. We are to forgive as we have been forgiven

(Mt. 6:14-15). To have a strong and healthy family, brothers and sisters living in peace and harmony, Apostle Paul instructs us, "Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace." (Eph. 4:2-3). "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up. "Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers." (Gal. 6:9-10)

We praise and thank God who has adopted us as His children. We are comforted to call Him "Abba, Father". As His sons and daughters we will live by the Spirit to inherit the eternal life He has prepared for us in the kingdom of God. As we love one another as brothers and sisters, we are also glad that our love has been extended to others through the sharing of the gospel of Jesus Christ and in many practical ways. We confess our weaknesses and sins, which have led us to conflicts and division in the family. We will strive to heal, restore and build up our relationship as brothers and sisters. We pray that God's name will be glorified and He will bless our church family with more brothers and sisters following and serving our Lord Christ Jesus.



HP 2019 Reflections



One of the ways God's been working in the wider English community at CCC this year has been the breaking down of artificial barriers between congregations, bringing together leadership structures, and creating spaces for intentional inter-congregational fellowship. This generated great opportunity to serve each other in love, as one wider English community.

Undoubtedly, the capstone of this has been the Combined English Houseparty. With nearly 200 people attending over October long weekend, we heard from God's word as one community, studied it together as one community, praised God through song as one community, and sought to apply it practically as one community.

The topic of this year's Combined English Houseparty was Hope, in particular, "Hope that Transforms". We were privileged to have Reverend Stuart Coulton (Principal of Sydney Missionary and Bible College) unpacking this transformative theme of Scripture over three deeply encouraging talks. We then split off into smaller inter-congregational bible study groups, digging deeper into what God had to say about the end goal of our transformative hope (in Heaven –



from Revelation), and what it means to wait in hope (in a hostile world – from 1 Peter). And of course, it wouldn't be a Houseparty without "compulsory fun", where members from different congregations were grouped together to answer trivia questions, and complete various challenges involving household objects.

Not only was this year's Houseparty a great time of inter-congregational fellowship, so was the many months' worth of effort put in by all the volunteers. We had members from every English congregation in each team, leveraging each other's strengths and sharing the load

Maintainence Update

Main Church Major Repairs

Stage 1 – Jan/Feb 2020, external stonework make-safe, masonry repointing, rainwater goods and associated flashings remediation work for the main church building commences, should be completed within 2 - 3 months.

Stage 2 – Jul/Aug 2020, internal render repairing and repainting work is expected.

Redevelopment of the Christian Education Centre

With the endorsement of the BOE, an internal project management team has been set up to facilitate a feasibility study into the possibility of redeveloping the Christian Education Centre. The project team has commissioned various professional consultants to assist, including heritage consultants, quantity surveyors, financial and tax experts etc. to provide advice to the church about the implications and costs of this redevelopment.

Consultation and dialogue with various Board of Deacons (BODs) has commenced and draft of the feasibility study will be available to our church for feedback and suggestions by first quarter of 2020, possibly towards a vote in the AGM in 2020.

Maintenance Funding Strategy

A "Repair Fund" has been set up to set aside money specifically for the repairs and maintenance of the church building. For the past two years, \$50k per year has been budgeted to come from the general fund offertory and will continue as long as the general offertory can support this.

How you may contribute?

The money spent on the Christian Education Centre redevelopment will come from the School Building Fund. Hence, you can consider contributing to this fund and you will be eligible for a tax deduction on this donation.

Methods:

- (a) Additional weekly offertory can be made in marked envelop stating "REPAIR FUND".
- (b) Transfer Fund Electronically (EFT) into our general church account (ending in 3060) with a description of "REPAIR FUND".
